Bara, whose family is from Jordan, is surrounded by arching design motifs borrowed from a Jordanian mosque as well as from the Islamic Society of Milwaukee. Bara's name, which means "innocence" in Arabic, is written in the background. When Bara visited me in my studio, it was only a few days before Ramadan, so she brought dates, rose water candies, and olive oil from her family's olive trees, displaying her generous spirit. I included gold roses and stylized

date palm leaves to reference her thoughtfulness. Her spirit is warm and caring, so pink in the background captures her generous heart.

creates ball bearings for planes, so I stylized ball bearings in mandalalike patterns. There are five beside him and five above him, a nod to his five siblings. He is from Jacksonville, Florida, the city of bridges, so I included a bridge on the outside border. Having grown up in Florida, Mitchel loves the ocean and especially octopuses, so I included creeping octopus tentacles in the corner. His love of "Star Wars" is referenced in the top and bottom portions of the piece, and the feathers are a nod to his work that

The purple and lavender flowers throughout the piece reference her late mother's favorite flower and her importance in Margaret's life. The interlocking rings signify her upcoming marriage and her interest in wedding photography. Margaret's initials and her fiancée's initials are drawn within the circles. The red circular design references her land of birth, China, from where she was adopted. The large four leaves surrounding Margaret symbolize her adopted family of origin — her mother, father and brother.

Alan Goodman

Alan, teacher and baker/owner of A Goodman's Desserts, is represented beneath a golden dome, a nod to his church and his spiritual home. An image of Alan as a young boy and his father with a homemade cake is depicted above the words: "A GOODMAN." This is a nod to not only Alan's business and name, but also to the way he has lived his life — inspired by his father to be a good man, father, and husband. Part of Alan's favorite quote is included: "I can do all things [through Christ]." His wife and three children are represented through the hearts at the foundation of the piece. Each heart is the color of a family member's birthstone.

Combining the natural beauty of Oak Creek Campus' 40 acres of wetlands with flora and fauna symbolic to the LGBTQIA+ community, this seven-panel piece recalls the changing of the seasons and cycle of life while celebrating the many facets of the human experience. The red, orange, and yellow panels depict winter and autumn. The green, blue, and violet panels showcase scenes of summer and spring. At the center, hand silhouettes of MATC students and alumni form the shape of hearts, with one student rising over a rainbow, displaying the train of a peacock. The feathers are stylized using the colors of a variety of pride flags, both current and historical. Individually, each panel challenges the viewer to search for the deeper meaning of the objects presented. As a whole, it moves from elements of loss and sorrow on the left, segueing to hope and the future on the right, interrupted in the center by the desire for self-expression we all have, and a reminder to have a little bit of fun in life..



These panels depict an origin story of the working class in Milwaukee. The central figure of a welder constructs an iron sky with stars streaming out of the weld over the city. People from other places aboard steamships come to Milwaukee seeking a better life and to work in the developing industry along Lake Michigan and the city's rivers. Those workers organized for humanity and dignity, demanding the eight-hour workday in 1886. The looming clocks throughout the painting represent the struggle for workers to gain more control over their lives and time.


DAVID PEREZ Artist


